What are GCSEs?

GCSE stands for General Certificate of Secondary Education. They are qualifications taken by most students in year 11.

GCSEs are usually studied full-time at school or college.

Your work in the classroom and sometimes in an exam, count towards the GCSE.

Types of GCSE

GCSEs are available in more than 40 subjects. Examples include English, science, languages, engineering and tourism. There are lots more!

GCSE short courses are good if you need more time to study.
